BENGALURU: The Government's Karnataka decision to raise the minimum age for tobacco consumption product has received widespread support due to its positive environmental impact and its potential to discourage usage. However, some individuals emphasise the importance of effectively implementing this decision.

September Health Minister Dinesh Gundu Rao stated that the government has decided to increase the minimum age for consumption of tobacco products from 18 to 21. He mentioned this would be set into action after the amendment of The Cigarettes and Other Tobacco Products Act (COTPA).

Speaking to The Beacon, Ravindra A from Utile Foundation, Rehabilitation Centre said that 18 to 21 does make a difference. "Framing the policies does not help unless and until there is someone who monitors if it has been implemented or not," he added. He also suggested that increasing the age limit is just postponing the gateway for the next three years.

"I think if it should be increased to 21 then the sales should be prohibited for the ages above 45 also, as they are more prone to cardiac arrests and other diseases," said a tobacco factory owner

"It is obviously good in terms of pollution and safety youth but definitely a loss for us in terms of business", he added.

COTPA rules to | Music therapy as a tool for suicide prevention

Good mental health involves emotional wellbeing, having the ability to cope with stress, maintaining fulfilling relationships, and achieving personal goals while experiencing happiness. National suicide prevention month is to create awareness about the suicidal tendencies faced by our acquaintances and to help those who are on the verge of committing suicide, said Sushma Kaushik, a psychologist and music therapist.

Speaking to the Beacon in the backdrop of National Suicide Prevention Month she described suicidal tendencies as such thoughts, thinking patterns, behaviours that an individual contemplates that aggravate the will to end life. It is often due to overwhelming emotional pain and despair.

She added that depression

and stress can also be contributing factors suicidal tendencies, as these mental health problems have visible symptoms such as low mood, loss of energy, changes in appetite, and feelings of worthlessness. These symptoms give rise to thoughts of self-harm, and they get these suicidal thoughts when the dopamine setting realistic level drops.

Young adolescents who are undergoing stress and pressure and have difficulty balancing between work and personal life can approach a professional psychologist or take a counselling session. At the same time, giving them some personal time,

and maintaining a healthy lifestyle are very important. Family members and peer groups should be aware of the problems, such as sleeplessness, getting into fights, and isolating from the outer world, that are faced by an individual and be empathetic by understanding

and being non-judgmental about the issues, and help them overcome these tendencies, she said.

Music therapy can be a complementary approach, for suicide prevention. Such support groups will be really helpful as the individual can share their problems with the people, and by doing so, they will feel better, she said. Maintaining a healthy social life and connecting with friends who understand your challenges, sharing your personal problems with your family and your near and dear ones and dedicating time to hobbies and activities you enjoy can provide a much-needed mental break, she added.

The National Suicide Prevention Lifeline, Crisis Text Line, and NAMI are some organisations an suicidal individual can approach when they face suicidal tendencies.
