Services to be disrupted as Docs plan stir

BENGALURU: The much-lauded role of doctors as the front line COVID-warriors is after all a lip service; this seems to be true considering they haven't been paid the risk allowance they were entitled to, for half a year.

Namratha C, President, Karnataka Association of Resident Doctors told the Beacon that junior resident doctors and interns across the state will stage a protest on Wednesday, October 7th in response to the deteriorating working conditions of Post Graduate Trainees (PGT) in Karnataka. "Almost all government medical colleges were turned into Covid Care Centers. So, we were only made to work under Covid

related areas because of which nothing related to our academics happened. We understand that it's a pandemic and being doctors we have to work for the nation. But, we worked at the

cost of our academics." she said.

Risk allowance associated with the perilous working environment also saw no response with PGTs being left without months of unpaid

dues. "We worked from day one of Covid. We wanted risk allowance during the peak of the first wave when many of our PGT's tested positive. It was during this time that the government denied proper

quarantine facilities. We do not want charity. We are asking risk allowance for whatever work we're doing," she adds.

The protest came in the wake of the hefty fee hike for the PGTs. "In 2018 our academic fees were just Rs. 30,000. All of a sudden in 2019 our fees were hiked to Rs. 1,30,000, nearly five times more." In comparison, she noted that the stipend was hiked from Rs. 30,000 to Rs. 45,000.

She also pointed out that they had to resort to such drastic measures as the Minister of Health and Family Welfare and Medical Education, K. Sudhakar failed to address their concerns even after repeated attempts.

Chennai sees a rise in dengue cases

CAMPUS: Amid the ongoing Covid-19 pandemic, Chennai has been witnessing a spike in Dengue cases. The estimated record counts up to 2617 as of now. A total of 231 cases were recorded in August and 201 in September.

Community medicine postgraduate student and a Chennai resident, Dr. Aamina Hussain said that the workload of doctors will be increased if the situation gets out of control. "The patient has to be isolated until the COVID negative report is provided and this will lead to delay in curing the disease," she added.

Dr. Aamina also stated that the residents should avoid stagnating the water as it facilitates the breeding grounds for the mosquitos. She suggested that everyone should be equipped with mosquito repellants and sanitise their surroundings.

Tamil Nadu Health Minister M.A. Subramanian inspected the prevention campaigns organised by the corporation on Monday. Chennai recorded 2410 cases back in 2020 and currently records 20 new cases every day. The cases are expected to rise further in October owing to the upcoming monsoon season.

Schools flout Maha Govt's order on attendance

BENGALURU: Parents are concerned about children's health and academic progress after schools impose conditions to ensure that every student attends offline class, despite Maharashtra government's directions that the attendance shall be voluntary.

Saju Antony, electrical technician at Sahara Aamby Valley City, Lonavala said, "My son's school is implementing the voluntary attendance option. My daughter's school however, is not making it easy for her in class 10. The school authorities said she will miss lab hours and marks. They are not introducing online alternatives either." He added that his daughter attended

class on Monday and social distancing norms were not followed, hence he is worried about possible health issues.

Animol Jixon, a pharmacist in Pune said, "My children have mandatory offline attendance on Mondays and Fridays, so that nobody leaves the city for weekend holidays." The schools also have an attendance rule. "Failing the rule, students will not be promoted. My eldest is in class 9 now and next year is important for her. This is so insensitive," she added.

Aditya Wagh, an entrepreneur in Mumbai said, "Nothing is completely back to normal, and attendance is voluntary for a reason. The authorities said my child's marks are at risk if we are not ready to send him to school.

"Our engineering teams have learned that configuration changes on the backbone routers that coordinate network traffic between our data centers caused issues that interrupted this communication. This disruption to network traffic had a cascading effect on the way our data centers communicate, bringing our services to a halt."
